Good evening, everyone.</p> <p>3 If you wouldn't mind standing with us and</p> <p>4 Mr. Leshner is going to lead us in the opening</p> <p>5 prayer followed by the pledge of allegiance.</p> <p>6 (Prayer and pledge of allegiance.)</p> <p>7 MR. PACK: Thank you. Welcome, everyone.</p> <p>8 Thanks for coming out with us. We do have one</p> <p>9 change to the agenda. Next item on your agenda,</p> <p>3 Council, you have a Proclamation for American</p> <p>4 Heart Month, February of 2020. We have with us</p> <p>5 Mr. Clay Stamp, director of emergency services</p> <p>6 and assistant County Manager. Clay, good to</p> <p>7 see.</p> <p>8 CLAY STAMP: Good to see you, Mr. Council</p> <p>9 President and members of the Council. I've</p> <p>10 invited Gary Jones from the Talbot County</p> <p>11 Paramedic Foundation, and Greg Fries is our</p> <p>12 special program paramedic up with me. As well</p> <p>13 as Doctor Jeff Etherton, who heads the</p> <p>14 interventional cardiology operation at Shore</p> <p>15 Regional Health and a good friend many of us</p> <p>16 here in Talbot County. Mr. Council President,</p> <p>17 I can't believe a year has gone by already.</p> <p>18 This is something we do annually. It's</p> <p>19 something that's important to Talbot County.</p> <p>20 We recognize the importance of life saving</p> <p>21 efforts early when somebody suffers cardiac</p>

We had a</p> <p>18 chance to go through those, speak to Ms. Lane,</p> <p>19 our fiscal officer. Do we have any additions,</p> <p>20 deletions or corrections to those</p> <p>21 disbursements? Hearing none, the Chair moves</p>	<p>1 arrest. And since it's National Heart Month, I</p> <p>2 know you have a proclamation you want to read,</p> <p>3 I just wanted to highlight the vast partnership</p> <p>4 that we have in this County to make sure that</p> <p>5 we're prepared to engage in early intervention</p> <p>6 when somebody has a heart attack or goes into</p> <p>7 cardiac arrest, because the data shows very</p> <p>8 clearly that early bystander CPR and the use of</p> <p>9 automated external defibrillators coupled with</p> <p>10 quick advance life support and deliver a</p> <p>11 patient to definitive treatment that an</p> <p>12 interventional cardiology facility saves lives.</p> <p>13 So what I would like to do is pitch it over</p> <p>14 real quick to Gary Jones who is here on behalf</p> <p>15 of the Paramedic Foundation to talk just</p> <p>16 quickly about some of the history in Talbot</p> <p>17 County with the partnership.</p> <p>18 GARY JONES: Thank you once again for</p> <p>19 inviting me to speak before you. As Clay</p> <p>20 indicated, these events are often called chains</p> <p>21 of survival, and they really truly are linked</p>

1 together in the sense that in order to survive
 2 a heart attack, it's very important that you
 3 have bystanders trained in CPR. A number of
 4 efforts have taken place for bystander CPR
 5 training over the years and we'll have it again
 6 this year. The other is the early recognition
 7 of the need to defibrillate the heart muscle.
 8 And that is instead of beating the way it
 9 should, it's quivering and fibrillating. And
 10 so the AED devices that have been deployed
 11 throughout the County are the first line in
 12 order for that to happen. Bystanders and
 13 people trained in CPR are also trained on AED
 14 devices, how to apply the device, trigger the
 15 device, and how to bring about life saving
 16 reversal of fibrillation to a more viable
 17 rhythm. All of that is extremely important in
 18 the chain of survival, and then hands off to
 19 the paramedic services and transport to a
 20 cardiac interventional center.
 21 CLAY STAMP: That's a good segway into

1 Greg Fries who is going to share that we have an
 2 opportunity this month to offer training to the
 3 public.
 4 GREG FRIES: So we'll be having our CPR
 5 marathon, and that's at the community center on
 6 February 25th. And it's free CPR training.
 7 It's not certification. It's a friends and
 8 family course. And it starts at 9:00 a.m. and
 9 is through 6:00 p.m. Each course is about 75
 10 minutes.
 11 CLAY STAMP: So we certainly encourage the
 12 public to come out to that training. The more
 13 we train the better off we are. And if you can
 14 continue to bear with me, I know you have a
 15 busy schedule, but Doctor Etherton is here on
 16 behalf of Shore Regional Health and certainly
 17 if you have anything to say.
 18 DOCTOR EHERTON: Yeah, I would just like
 19 to say that the incredible cooperation of the
 20 EMS team here in Talbot County and the team
 21 that Gary has helped us to put together at

1 Shore Regional Health Easton has continued to
 2 provide this care and save lives. We, again,
 3 this last fiscal year took care of over 200
 4 individuals who were suffering a major heart
 5 attack. And the work we do, there is no way we
 6 could do it without this incredible team. So I
 7 really appreciate all the hard work they have
 8 done. And we hope to continue to build our
 9 program and continue to do what we're doing.
 10 Thanks.
 11 MR. PACK: I have a question, Mr. Stamp,
 12 to step back. The CPR marathon, two questions.
 13 We've been doing this for a number of years,
 14 what year is this for the marathon.
 15 CLAY STAMP: I believe this may be our
 16 sixth year. And we have trained hundreds of
 17 people every year in CPR. It's been a success
 18 and it's a partnership, even with the Chamber
 19 of Commerce and other civic organizations that
 20 support that sending individuals for training.
 21 It's a real success.

 5 eighth year, we do a benefit, a heart to heart
 6 dinner if you will, which is a dinner pairing,
 7 an auction. We've been, again, I said for
 8 eight years we have been doing this. We have
 9 donated over \$300,000 to Children's Hospital
 10 for direct research. We actually -- a lot of
 11 it goes to a research assistant for one of the
 12 doctors there, Doctor Gruel, to help develop a
 13 catheter that can go into a child's chest. As
 14 an adult it's pretty big. A child you're
 15 working on something smaller. So it's been
 16 really exciting for us to see that project go.
 17 We're getting really close with the FDA I think
 18 on that. And last year we made an initiative
 19 to donate \$25,000 towards the placement of
 20 AED's around sports fields and schools within
 21 Talbot County. And we have been very happy

1 with our collaboration with Talbot ES. It's
 2 been great thus far and we look forward to a
 3 continued relationship, we're going to keep
 4 going.
 5 MR. PACK: Let me say first of all, thank
 6 you very much on all the work you're doing,

 9 very, very important as you know.

 20 although genetic factors play a role in many
 21 instances of cardiovascular disease, one of the

 2 problems, it's also one of the most preventable
 3 diseases when each individual takes
 4 responsibility for his or her own health and
 5 the health of our children by exercising
 6 regularly, maintaining a healthy weight, eating
 7 balanced and nutritious meals, avoiding use of
 8 tobacco, using alcohol in moderation, and
 9 working with a health care provider to prevent
 10 or treat conditions which can lead to heart
 11 disease; and whereas as families and
 12 communities we can encourage healthy eating
 13 habits, promote increased physical activity to
 14 help reduce risk factors and prevent heart
 15 disease, and train to perform life saving
 16 cardiopulmonary resuscitation, CPR; and whereas
 17 a lethal complication that can develop while
 18 having a heart attack is sudden cardiac arrest,
 19 which is a leading cause of death, claiming
 20 nearly 356,000 lives each either, during a
 21 sudden cardiac arrest heart function ceases

1 abruptly and without warning. When this
 2 occurs, the heart it no longer able to pump
 3 blood to the rest of the body and in some 90%
 4 of victims death occurs; and whereas once a
 5 cardiac arrest occurs, CPR and defibrillation
 6 are required within the first several minutes
 7 to restore electrical activity to the heart and
 8 to provide the heart's pumping function, and the
 9 availability of automated external
 10 defibrillators, AED's, is critical for rapid
 11 response to cardiac arrest; and whereas the
 12 Talbot County Department of Emergency Services,
 13 in partnership with the Talbot County Paramedic
 14 Foundation, the Talbot County Volunteer Fire
 15 and Rescue Association, the Maryland Institute
 16 for Emergency Medical Services, and the
 17 University of Maryland Shore Regional Health
 18 coordinates a comprehensive County-wide approach
 19 to addressing cardiac care through public
 20 education and state of the art life saving
 21 services. Now therefore we, the County Council

 15 development. It's really tough to say it's not
 16 consistent with your plan when your plan

 20 15 to note alternative wastewater disposal or
 21 spray irrigation is a beneficial way of getting

 20 gerrymander that got this in, the fact that I'm
 21 here speaking with my fellow citizens, because

 11 lands, the headwaters are deeply dissected
 12 within the agricultural land and they have been
 13 protected for many, many decades, perhaps
 14 centuries by the smoke restrictions of Talbot
 15 County. The net result is that these headwater
 16 streams, several of them, support tall forests
 17 and a great biodiversity. I intend in the
 18 spring when I have access to do bird surveys on
 19 some of them as well. Within these steep
 20 slopes there are bench levels, perfect hiking
 21 trails, which I have hiked following deer paths

1 and such. So this is park quality land. And
 2 also you have the so-called Trappe lakeside.
 3 The lake is in fact a mine, it's a huge gravel
 4 input. It's completely unimproved at this
 5 point. It has bare eroding slopes on one side

 7 He wants that to be a public park. I would go

 21 that are going in. It would mean a smaller

 15 is that since the implementation of the EMS
 16 system in Talbot County, and the national
 17 standard that is followed by states and
 18 counties all over the country is a National
 19 Fire Protection Association, NFPA 1710, and it
 20 deals with the delivery of advanced life
 21 support response. And that's been a goal that

1 we have tried to obtain here in this County
 2 since the system was in put in place. And that
 3 goal is that we provide advanced life support
 4 response within eight minutes of a call for
 5 help 90 percent of the time. Now we're
 6 currently running on average about 82 percent
 7 of the time. And we're seeing that time
 8 actually decrease -- or actually increase
 9 because of the number of times our crews are
 10 tied up, or we reach our saturation point. The
 11 second piece of it, in addition to career
 12 service, I tell people that our system in
 13 Talbot County is a 90/10 system. The County
 14 runs 90 percent of the advanced life support
 15 calls in the County but we depend on our
 16 volunteer fire companies to run about
 17 10 percent of those calls, with Oxford being
 18 probably the most active. What we have seen
 19 over the last number of years the north end of
 20 the County is struggling to get the volunteer
 21 crews out. There is a lot of reasons why. But

 13 would like to. I share a story, I spent 15
 14 minutes in the back of a car with a little girl
 15 waiting for a unit to come out of Caroline
 16 County because we didn't have a unit available.
 17 And even though I'm a paramedic, I couldn't
 18 transport her. But that was the longest 15
 19 minutes that I spent in a long time. I had to
 20 wait for that unit to come out of Caroline
 21 County. These are real issues. The second

Page 164

1 issue, the challenge we're facing, is the
 2 changing health care dynamic. There have been
 3 decisions made over the last several years at
 4 the federal level and at the state level that
 5 govern how hospitals take care of patients.
 6 And that policy goes like this. There are
 7 fewer inpatient stays in hospitals, and
 8 hospitals are incentivized to discharge
 9 patients as soon as possible and to try to
 10 reduce the number of readmissions. What does
 11 that mean for emergency medical services. It
 12 means we have sicker patients at home with more
 13 complex chronic illnesses that call 911. And
 14 so that's increasing volume, that's increasing
 15 complexity of calls. So right now there is a
 16 vacuum to try to address the needs of these
 17 individuals, and we've implemented some of
 18 those which I'll talk about in just a minute.
 19 The next issue that we're facing is Easton is a
 20 health care hub. So if you ask me what are
 21 these peak times when we look at the data, I

1 would say to you it's Monday, Wednesday, and
 2 Friday. You would ask the question, Monday,
 3 Wednesday and Friday, I would think it would be
 4 like Friday or the weekend or something, right.
 5 Why Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Because
 6 Easton is a regional health care hub. That
 7 means everybody on Mondays, Wednesdays and
 8 Fridays come to Easton for medical
 9 appointments. The dispatchers have coined it
 10 Medical Monday. They know that every Monday
 11 they are going to peak out. So those people
 12 come for their appointments, and they have
 13 chest pains, they have trouble breathing, they
 14 have a diabetic emergency, they have a fall,
 15 and they are all critical calls that need help
 16 and we respond to them.
 17 MS. PRICE: Are we transporting them from
 18 the doctor's office to the hospital.
 19 CLAY STAMP: We're absolutely transporting
 20 them.
 21 MS. PRICE: We're not going to their

Page 166

1 house, they are already here.
 2 CLAY STAMP: So somebody has chest pain on
 3 a tread mill or somebody falls or they have a
 4 diabetic emergency, doctor's offices aren't
 5 necessarily equipped to handle a crisis or
 6 critical situation. So they do call us so that
 7 we can get that individual engaged in life
 8 saving treatment and get them to the proper
 9 place, which is an emergency department. And
 10 it may not be, you know, a laboratory or a
 11 family physician. The next thing that we face
 12 in Talbot County is an aging community. We
 13 know that we have a significant number of
 14 elderly people that move to this county. And
 15 when you look at the statistics, for example on
 16 cardiac arrest, we actually range higher than a
 17 lot of other jurisdictions. It's because we
 18 have a lot of elderly folks. Those are complex
 19 calls. When we respond to a cardiac arrest or
 20 respond to a stroke call, initially in order to
 21 implement lifesaving treatment it requires --

1 it requires at least two units initially. And
 2 then we split some people up and we get them to
 3 the hospital. So all these are factors that
 4 are creating this challenge. So what are the
 5 solutions. We have done a couple things. One,
 6 you've all been very gracious, you've allowed
 7 us to put a 24 hour supervisor on so that
 8 supervisor can respond in on those complex
 9 calls, make up as part of the crew so we don't
 10 have to break another crew down. That's been
 11 done over the years. You've implemented power
 12 lift systems so we don't have to alert the fire
 13 department to help us move people into the
 14 ambulance. We have also done something really
 15 unique. We're one of about five jurisdictions
 16 in Maryland that have implemented something
 17 called a mobile integrated health program. You
 18 authorized that I hire a special program
 19 paramedic, we call him our special paramedic,
 20 he's here, Greg Fries. And Greg is working the
 21 health department. He partners up with the

1 public health nurse and a pharmacist from Shore
 2 Regional Health, as they donated a pharmacist
 3 to participate in this program. We identify
 4 individuals that are repeat callers to 911 that
 5 use our system repeatedly that have chronic
 6 illness but maybe are not necessarily acute in
 7 nature. In many cases they have situations
 8 that -- they have tough situations. So Greg
 9 and the health department, you know, I'll share
 10 with you, I was in a meeting with him, we had
 11 probably 40 different organizations in Talbot
 12 County that provide service to elderly and
 13 people that are in need. He becomes a
 14 facilitator to help address needs. And by
 15 doing that we give better service to folks that
 16 need that service. They don't need to be in an
 17 emergency room. He'll coordinate having a ramp
 18 built for somebody that has a wheelchair or,
 19 you know -- so anyway, we're working this
 20 mobile integrated health program. But in
 21 itself it's not going to resolve the issue.

1 MS. PRICE: Can I ask a question. I ask
 2 this because there is a bill that we're
 3 considering tomorrow that has to do with
 4 raising the reimbursement for ambulance things
 5 but also includes this mobile integrated health
 6 to \$100 per interaction. That would be helpful
 7 to get reimbursed that.
 8 CLAY STAMP: Absolutely. So there are a
 9 number of things happening on the federal and
 10 state level. There is a renewed or maybe it's
 11 an initial recognition that there is a heavy
 12 burden that is being placed on communities to

 14 Federal Government has implemented a several
 15 year process to better understand how EMS
 16 works, the reimbursement rates for Medicare,

 21 state level, for example Medicare -- sorry,

 8 we have a system that cost us about four-point
 9 some million dollars to get about 1.3 back in

 15 it didn't include the mobile integrated health

 20 Where is all the Bozman and Neavitt residents.
 21 I thought they would be here to take part in

 2 RAY CLARKE: Well, first off, let me say
 3 that prior to even putting the project out to
 4 bid, we actually had to submit the RFP, the
 5 request for proposal package, to the Maryland


