<p>1 TRANSCRIPT OF PROCEEDINGS</p> <p>2</p> <p>3 (Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance.)</p> <p>4 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. We've got an agenda</p> <p>5 before us. The Council has had a chance to</p> <p>6 take a look at the agenda. Is there any</p> <p>7 additions, deletions, or correction to the</p> <p>8 agenda, Council?</p> <p>9 MS. MIELKE: No.</p> <p>10 MR. CALLAHAN: Hearing none, the chair</p> <p>11 moves that the agenda be accepted as unanimous</p> <p>12 consent.</p> <p>13 Now, what we're going to do is we're going</p> <p>14 to have a discussion on Maryland House Bill 791</p> <p>15 on safety and correctional enforcement.</p> <p>16 And I would like to ask the Sheriff to</p> <p>17 come on up in front of us, please.</p> <p>18 SHERIFF GAMBLE: Good evening.</p> <p>19 MR. CALLAHAN: Welcome.</p> <p>20 SHERIFF GAMBLE: Thank you. Thanks for</p> <p>21 having me. Thanks for taking time to read my</p>	<p>1 streets of Easton. Not just Easton and Talbot</p> <p>2 County, but all throughout Maryland.</p> <p>3 I'm a member of the Maryland Sheriffs</p> <p>4 Association, as you probably know. We go to</p> <p>5 monthly meetings. We meet with the directors</p> <p>6 of Homeland Security, who are already ramping</p> <p>7 up efforts in Maryland because if they can't</p> <p>8 pick these people up at our Detention Centers,</p> <p>9 they'll have to be picking them up on the</p> <p>10 street.</p> <p>11 And that's going to cause I think more</p> <p>12 stress in the immigrant community, more concern</p> <p>13 because they've already said, and they said</p> <p>14 this when they started actually enforcing the</p> <p>15 law. They said if we have to go to a house to</p> <p>16 look for this particular person and there's</p> <p>17 five other people in that house and their</p> <p>18 status is not legal, then everybody is going.</p> <p>19 So there's going to be -- I think that</p> <p>20 this, instead of picking them up in a safe</p> <p>21 location, having our Detention Center and the</p>

<p>1 letter to you.</p> <p>2 MR. CALLAHAN: Yes, sir.</p> <p>3 SHERIFF GAMBLE: The purpose of my letter</p> <p>4 to you is since I don't have any responsibility</p> <p>5 at the Detention Center, which falls under, as</p> <p>6 you well know, under your purview and</p> <p>7 jurisdiction, I wanted to make you aware of</p> <p>8 this bill that recently passed both the House</p> <p>9 and the Senate in Maryland. It's sitting on</p> <p>10 the Governor's desk. As far as I know today,</p> <p>11 it has not been signed, but I did not check</p> <p>12 this morning to see if it had been signed.</p> <p>13 MR. CALLAHAN: I'm with you.</p> <p>14 SHERIFF GAMBLE: And I know that under</p> <p>15 Maryland rules, if the Governor elects to veto</p> <p>16 the bill, it would go to the next, probably go</p> <p>17 the next legislative session. They would need</p> <p>18 a three-fifths majority to override the</p> <p>19 Governor's veto.</p> <p>20 My main concern with this bill is I think</p> <p>21 that it's going to cause more chaos in the</p>	<p>1 current understanding there is, our Detention</p> <p>2 Center gives them notice if the detainer is</p> <p>3 filed. They come and they pick them up inside</p> <p>4 the sallyport. Safer for the community, safer</p> <p>5 for the HSI agents, safer for the immigrant,</p> <p>6 versus letting them walk out on the street on</p> <p>7 Dover Road and then having to chase or look for</p> <p>8 people in our communities.</p> <p>9 So I wanted to bring it to your attention</p> <p>10 since the Detention Center, mainly it impacts</p> <p>11 that. It will limit some other contact that my</p> <p>12 detectives or my Sheriff's deputies could have</p> <p>13 with ICE. It doesn't limit it severely, but</p> <p>14 there is also some -- it opens up some civil,</p> <p>15 more civil liability should somebody not follow</p> <p>16 the exact letter of the law that we would not</p> <p>17 ordinarily be exposed to.</p> <p>18 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay.</p> <p>19 SHERIFF GAMBLE: As well as the</p> <p>20 corrections.</p> <p>21 So with that, I was asking you to review</p>

Page 6	<p>1 the letter and consider asking the Governor to 2 veto the bill.</p> <p>3 MR. CALLAHAN: Mr. Stamp.</p> <p>4 MR. STAMP: So on behalf of the director 5 of corrections, who is out of town at this 6 point, but I've had conversations with him, had 7 conversations with the Sheriff, had looked into 8 the matter, the passage of this bill would 9 affect how we currently operate in Talbot 10 County.</p> <p>11 There is an unofficial relationship I 12 guess you would have, or protocol would be 13 better said, between our Corrections Department 14 and federal authorities.</p> <p>15 In that, the federal authorities actually 16 monitor a computer software program, and they 17 know where certain people they're looking for 18 are incarcerated.</p> <p>19 And when it pops up in Talbot County, they 20 make a call to Talbot County and let them know 21 that they have a retainer in play for a certain</p>	Page 8	<p>1 personally civilly liable. So it would impact 2 our operation.</p> <p>3 I would note that Council on 4 February 24th, through your process of 5 reviewing bills, did oppose this bill in the 6 general assembly.</p> <p>7 So the ask this evening is that you 8 basically reaffirm your opposition to the bill 9 by sending a letter to the Governor asking him 10 to consider vetoing it. So this would be just 11 simply reaffirming your opposition to the bill 12 that you expressed on the 24th of February.</p> <p>13 SHERIFF GAMBLE: I would add one thing. 14 In the bill, it limits you, as the County 15 Council, and every county in Maryland on what 16 the Detention Centers can do. But it still 17 allows the State to do the same thing that we 18 currently do.</p> <p>19 And I think it's in response to a number 20 of counties where Sheriffs have 287G programs. 21 So I think this is a cross between -- and the</p>
Page 7	<p>1 individual and that they would like to retain 2 that person once they're discharged from the 3 corrections facility.</p> <p>4 The correction facility only operates 5 under the orders of a judge. And so that's how 6 we incarcerate individuals. And it's very 7 specific as to how long we keep them and when 8 they're discharged.</p> <p>9 Twenty-four hours before they're 10 discharged, a phone call is made to the federal 11 authorities letting them know the discharge 12 time and date, at which time the federal 13 authorities are there to meet the individual.</p> <p>14 We don't hold anybody beyond what we're 15 required or directed to hold them under the 16 judicial direction. And that's important to 17 note.</p> <p>18 This, the passage of this bill will not 19 allow us to do that any longer. And further, 20 if we did do something like that, our 21 personnel, sworn personnel could be held</p>	Page 9	<p>1 Governor already signed a bill eliminating 287G 2 program, which would basically, you could have 3 deputies in your Detention Center trained in 4 the computer system. So everyone that's 5 arrested that comes in, whether it's DWI or 6 driving while suspended or whatever, gets 7 checked in the system. It's basically a 8 Homeland Security system.</p> <p>9 And then that correctional officer could 10 file a detainer on behalf of HSI on that 11 person. That's been eliminated, right. The 12 Governor has already signed that as emergency 13 legislation, went into effect.</p> <p>14 So us, as the Sheriffs across the State, 15 have no idea why they're doing this just to 16 local Detention Centers, why aren't they doing 17 it to the State prison system.</p> <p>18 MR. CALLAHAN: Right.</p> <p>19 SHERIFF GAMBLE: If they believe in this. 20 And I don't know. I don't know why. But I 21 think it's interesting that it doesn't want,</p>

1 the legislature doesn't want to take that
 2 authority away from the State, but they want to
 3 take it away from you, the locally elected
 4 people who actually run the local Detention
 5 Centers.
 6 So anyway.
 7 MR. CALLAHAN: Yup.
 8 SHERIFF GAMBLE: I mean it's politics at
 9 its best.
 10 MR. CALLAHAN: Right. Yeah. All right.
 11 Well, so open for discussion, Council.
 12 I mean my thoughts were -- did you want to
 13 say something?
 14 MR. THOMAS: No. I'm sorry. Mr. Stamp
 15 just asked if I had anything to add, and I just
 16 said no, I think everything I had to say had
 17 already been covered.
 18 MR. CALLAHAN: So you want to stay out of
 19 it, right?
 20 MR. THOMAS: I know you all have another
 21 meeting soon.

1 MR. CALLAHAN: No.
 2 MR. STAMP: I do want to say.
 3 MR. CALLAHAN: Sure.
 4 MR. STAMP: Just for clarity's sake. This
 5 law does have allowances for notification under
 6 certain conditions. Judicial warrant, active
 7 judicial warrant and certain felony convictions
 8 are exceptions to it.
 9 But in general, again, I want to be really
 10 clear that our Detention Center holds people
 11 based on a judicial warrant expressly directed
 12 by a judge to incarcerate an individual. We do
 13 not hold anybody one second longer than we're
 14 required to do so.
 15 At this point in time, we only make a
 16 phone call to let them know that a person is
 17 going to be discharged at a certain period of
 18 time or a certain time where they can engage
 19 that subject. And this would disallow that.
 20 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. I appreciate you
 21 clearing that up and being specific about that

1 because I'm thinking that with what Sheriff
 2 wants and what he's asking, I'm fine with it.
 3 I think we're going to -- I'm behind you
 4 100 percent.
 5 And the letter that was, on February 24th,
 6 that we supported and sent an unfavorable, we
 7 don't like that bill.
 8 So now the bill has been passed. So
 9 whatever we can do, and it's open for
 10 discussion, I'm fine with giving you what you
 11 need to help this not to pass.
 12 And I don't know what it's going to take.
 13 Obviously we got to do something sort of
 14 immediately because it's within 24 hours he's
 15 going to do something.
 16 So do you think, do you think that when we
 17 do something tonight, if Council ends up doing
 18 something tonight, is that something that we
 19 can do right away? I mean help me with that.
 20 SHERIFF GAMBLE: I mean I would think a
 21 simple letter saying we do not support this

1 bill, this is our Detention Center, we're
 2 elected to run our Detention Center.
 3 I mean if I was the one running the
 4 Detention Center, if it was the Sheriff was in
 5 charge like in some counties, I wouldn't be
 6 making this ask, because since I don't have the
 7 authority at the Detention Center. I think we
 8 run the Detention Center, we are locally
 9 elected to run our Detention Center as one of
 10 our duties, we are not in favor of this bill,
 11 we ask you to veto it.
 12 MR. CALLAHAN: Right. So what's the best
 13 way --
 14 SHERIFF GAMBLE: -- as simple as that.
 15 MR. STAMP: Yeah. We'd draft a letter and
 16 have it out first thing in the morning.
 17 MS. HAYTHE: So do we know if he signed
 18 the bill yet?
 19 MS. MIELKE: No.
 20 MR. CALLAHAN: He hasn't signed it?
 21 MS. MIELKE: I mean I looked into it, as

1 did the --
 2 MS. HAYTHE: He said he didn't look at it
 3 this morning to see if it's been signed.
 4 MS. MIELKE: But he's been following it.
 5 MS. HAYTHE: I know.
 6 MS. MIELKE: And I looked up.
 7 MS. HAYTHE: It's not signed yet. Okay.
 8 MR. STAMP: We can send a letter out this
 9 evening.
 10 MS. MIELKE: And I think it ought to go
 11 via email or something else.
 12 MR. STAMP: Yes. When we say send it, we
 13 will email it and then follow it up --
 14 MS. MIELKE: Okay. Just because when I
 15 write my letters, I have via email and regular
 16 mail, but that's just me. Sorry.
 17 MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah. No problem.
 18 MS. MIELKE: It's the lawyer in me.
 19 MR. CALLAHAN: So do we want to put, do we
 20 put a motion that we go ahead and make sure we
 21 put a second letter in that we're opposing

 2 MS. MIELKE: Yeah. I just want to mention
 3 that.
 4 MR. CALLAHAN: Yup.
 5 MS. MIELKE: I read in the media that at
 6 the last minute, the legislature pushed this
 7 through and that it was tantamount to making
 8 Maryland a sanctuary State, which is not our
 9 intention.
 10 And the position that the Sheriff took
 11 immediately with that hitting the news, I
 12 thought that we should support. And that's why
 13 I brought this to the attention.
 14 And I think it should go out -- should
 15 have gone out days ago, but it should go out
 16 immediately.
 17 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay.
 18 MS. MIELKE: Because we should support the
 19 Sheriff and the concept behind it.
 20 MR. CALLAHAN: I do, too.
 21 MS. MIELKE: It's safety to our community.

1 MR. CALLAHAN: Agreed. So is there a
 2 motion?
 3 MS. MIELKE: So moved.
 4 MR. CALLAHAN: Is there a second?
 5 MS. HAYTHE: Second.
 6 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. We got a motion and
 7 second. Madam Secretary, call the vote.
 8 SECRETARY: Mr. Callahan.
 9 MR. CALLAHAN: Aye.
