Easton, Maryland, brings renowned musicians to

delight, engage, and surprise today's audiences

and educate, inspire, and develop tomorrow's.

And whereas, Chesapeake Music was organized and hosted its first concert at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum in 1985.

And whereas, Chesapeake Music quickly grew to a much-anticipated two-week June music festival.

And whereas, Chesapeake Music created the international Chesapeake chamber music competition for young ensembles with a top prize of \$10,000, helping to launch the professional careers of multiple talented musicians and ensembles.

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And whereas, Chesapeake Music further broadened its impact with youth reach programming in partnership with Talbot Arts and Talbot County Public Schools by providing master classes for middle school band students with graduate music students from the University of Maryland.

And whereas, Chesapeake Music now provides year-round programming with interlude concerts featuring talented musicians, including rising stars from the field of classical, jazz, and crossover music in Easton's Ebenezer Theater.

And whereas, Chesapeake Music brings world class music to a growing audience of all ages on Maryland's Eastern Shore and beyond, while exporting something of the Chesapeake's uniqueness to musicians who take part in the festival, competition, and interlude concerts.

MS. SPARKS: So we have an amendment that 1 2 has been offered by Councilman Lesher regarding 3 amendment one. Does that have to be introduced before I 4 5 explain? MR. THOMAS: Yes. 6 7 MR. LESHER: So you want a show of hands to introduce? 8 9 MR. CALLAHAN: Yup. 10 MR. LESHER: So introduced by Haythe and 11 Lesher. 12 SECRETARY: Mr. Stepp, do you wish to 13 introduce amendment one? 14 MR. STEPP: No, ma'am. 15 MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. 16 MS. SPARKS: So a description of amendment one and what it includes. It is decreases in 17 the FY26 capital outlay budgets in the amount 18 19 of \$1,030,700 for several departments. 20 a result of capital outlay items that were able to be purchased in FY25 using fourth quarter 21

transfers in FY25.

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This also includes restoring funding back to the original request for Upper Shore Aging and the library. This also includes retirement costs of our community colleges in the amount of \$12,858, an additional \$440,098 for teachers' pensions. Both of those items were liabilities of the State of Maryland that were passed down to the counties. And these amounts reflect Talbot County's share.

This amendment also includes 1,100,000 in additional appropriation for Talbot County
Public Schools for critical needs based upon
their revised request. \$500,000 in salary
increases for teachers and support staff. And
the other portion is 600,000 for nine high
priority positions; two social workers, six
instructions assistants for multi-lingual
learners and special ed students, and one
special ed teacher.

This amendment includes an education

supplement of 1.5 cents and additional revenues related to that education supplement of \$1,540,098.

Also, there were minor amendments in the, in sections two and three. Excuse me.

Sections two and 16 of the amendment that are related to grants. A lot of our grants were not -- they received their notice of funding available at a late time and we weren't able to get the accurate numbers when we introduced Bill 1585.

So these are just tweaks, and they're revenue neutral for Talbot County taxpayers.

MS. HAYTHE: Okay.

MR. LESHER: So discussion on this one?

MR. CALLAHAN: Go ahead.

MR. LESHER: This, this, this is the, this would fulfill the school budget's reduced request plus the items that we've identified.

Knowing that the Blueprint is going to require us to increase, what, 4.9 million next

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year, this would be a small step in that direction. And frankly, it will make next year, an election year, a lot easier for all of us up here and a lot easier for our taxpayers. It will be a smaller increase, mandated increase next year if we, if we bite off this slightly larger additional piece.

I just think that this is prudent and takes the long view into consideration. And I'd urge, I'd urge support for this.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Yeah. Go ahead.

MS. HAYTHE: So while Mr. Lesher and I may not agree about the long view because a lot of the information that we hear about the future is estimated, so we're not quite sure what it's going to look like next year.

MR. CALLAHAN: Right.

MS. HAYTHE: But the reason why I agreed with the introduction was because of the salary increases and the new positions. So that seems to be vital in the request that came to us.

MS. SPARKS: The second amendment was requested by Council President Callahan. And that includes many of the items that I listed in the first amendment, but I will repeat them.

Decreases in the FY26 capital budget outlays of \$1,030,700 for several departments as a result of capital outlay items that were purchased in FY25 through fourth quarter transfer.

This also includes restoring funding back to the original request for Upper Shore Aging and the library, retirement costs of community colleges in the amount of \$12,858, \$440,098 for teachers's pension. Both of those items were liabilities of the State of Maryland that were passed down to the counties. And those amounts reflect Talbot County's share.

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This amendment also includes \$600,000 in additional appropriation for Talbot County

Public Schools for nine priority positions; two social workers, six instructional assistants for multi-lingual learners and special ed students, and one special ed teacher. This includes an education supplement and 1.06 cents and projected revenues from the education supplement of \$1,040,098.

It also includes the adjustments that I mentioned to the grant-related revenues and expenses.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Well, thank you.

So I do obviously support this. I thought the other -- we had that work session and -- huh?

MS. HAYTHE: Don't we have to introduce the amendment? Don't you have to introduce it?

MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah. I guess we should.

MS. HAYTHE: We did for the first one.

MR. CALLAHAN: Raise our hands.

13	getting more teachers and, you know, just
14	trying to help things along.
15	We had the other 440 for the pensions.
16	But I would ask, I would ask that the
17	School Board use the money that we give you for
18	teachers. I would like to see that and not for
19	something else. So I would like to see it for
20	the teachers.
21	Anybody else?

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MS. MIELKE: Yes. I'd just like to say that I was originally on board with this amendment, but I need more security that, in fact, if we do this budget amendment for this purpose, that it will, in fact, be used for that purpose. And I'm not advised that it necessarily would be.

So for that reason, I couldn't support it.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Okay.

MS. HAYTHE: No. I mean I've said it before. I believe that, you know, the teachers are important to our community as well as the students.

And we just need to make sure that the funding is getting down into the classroom to the teachers and that the appropriate increases, which we don't have control over, are across for the board, for teachers and administration across the board, same percentage.

So willing to support this because we know

that this is important to the school system in hiring those new positions that they asked for that Martha mentioned.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yup.

MR. LESHER: Well, folks, they say sausage making and legislation are two things that you don't want to watch being done, but here we are.

I will support this. I think we should be going farther. But this goes some distance, and certainly I will support this amendment since the first one was defeated.

MR. CALLAHAN: And I just will add one thing. I think, Ms. Mielke, I think we've got a phenomenal relationship with the school. And I trust that what they asked for, that's what they'll use the money for.

So I have no -- I don't have any, one way or the other, of they wouldn't use it for teachers. And because they've been great to us and we've been great to them, we've got a

phenomenal working relationship with them. So I would ask you to come along with us on that, please.

MS. MIELKE: I hear you.

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MR. CALLAHAN: Dave, would you like to say anything?

MR. STEPP: Yeah. Mr. President, thank you.

I'll add here, too, I will too be advocating here for this amendment. It was heard loud and clear that the positions, that nine positions that we're losing due to the lack of federal funding because of the COVID funds, we heard loud and clear that those positions are going away and that we'd like to retain them.

So that's the reason I'll be voting yes for this amendment.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Stepp.

8	MR. LESHER: Well, I'll start with a
9	number of thank yous first to the county
10	manager and his staff for presenting a tight
11	and balanced budget to this Council.
12	Second to our finance staff for leading us
13	through the smoothest ever process that allowed
14	the Council to focus on real issues without
15	losing focus on the details. And there are a
16	lot of details in \$160 million budget.
17	This process was as open and transparent
18	as any budget process I've yet participated in,
19	and your help with that made it so.
20	And I want to thank my colleagues on this
21	Council for deliberating with civility and

integrity.

I don't agree with everything in this budget. I think we're shortsighted on the school's budget in a way that will only make next year more painful, but there's much to be proud of here.

This Council continues to fund public safety as its top priority without neglecting the third critical leg of the public safety stool, our correctional officers. In addition, we are poised to complete a new Public Safety Building with full facilities for our Sheriff's Department and then install our 911 Center there, leaving the existing facility as a backup.

We are making investments that we prudently need to make in IT and other critical services across the county.

This budget lives up to our commitments, to prudent fiscal management, and for committing that additional penny on the

property tax to public safety.

And for that reason, that is a budget that I'm prepared to support.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Lesher.

Yup.

MS. MIELKE: Generally I support the budget. It was with deep regret that I couldn't vote to support it only because of having some assurances on the record that, in fact, the money that was going to be appropriated for the priority positions, which I think are extremely important, I just needed more, more assurances that it, in fact, could go to that position. Not that I don't trust the Talbot County Board of Education, because I do. But I just wanted to make sure that it was, in fact, going to be used for that purpose.

But I do support the schools, and I'm glad that I was the only one that voted no.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay.

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MS. HAYTHE: Well, I want to thank Clay and staff and Martha and Kaitlin for getting us through this process.

This is our third budget. And I must say to me, this was the most challenging budget that I've ever sat through. The decisions were very hard on some items.

The decisions were extremely hard for Talbot County Public Schools. Because as a supporter of education, like Mr. Lesher said, we did initially believe that the 1.1 should have been given, various different reasons between the two of us, but we felt it was important to do the 1.1 million. So we had to compromise.

My colleagues made this budget a little bit easier for me, and I truly appreciate that.

And I want to thank Talbot County Public Schools as well for answering the questions that I had.

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Thank you, Dr. P. Thank you, Cindy and Andy as well because it was, it was a lot of questions that were flying because it was a challenge to get down to the nitty-gritty and get to a point where the money was allocated to the school system. So I just want to say thank you to you guys as well.

And we will certainly do our best and continue to support Talbot County Public Schools. So thank you for the partnership, thank you for the transparency, and thank you for the continued partnership as well.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Thank you. Dave.

MR. STEPP: Yeah. I'll just, I'll continue in the vain of thanks here.

Just thanks to all the staff. Thanks to all of our departments. Thanks to all of our agencies who are part of this and make this happen.

Like you said, it was definitely a heavy

lift this year. But everyone buckled down, and we made it happen here. Just want to extend the thanks. Great job, everyone.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Good.

And I'll say the same thing what my colleagues did.

First of all, guys, thanks so much, Martha and Kaitlin. You made it easy for us really.

And I really thought what Keasha was saying about this is our third budget together with this Council. And I thought it went very, very good.

We did a little bit different style this year. And I thought staff did a good job really doing their homework and bringing everything to us. You know, cutting down a little bit of the time and stuff with the department heads and stuff.

And it wasn't nothing against them, but I have to reach out to them and tell them they did a great job, too, prepping for it, give us

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all the information that we needed. So I think they -- I think Brian Moore was kind of mad that he didn't get up in front of us. Right? You know what I mean? So he wanted to come really bad I'm sure.

But all kidding aside, this is tough to do. And I can say, Clay, you did a phenomenal job because we were underbudget this year, and a lot of people don't realize that. And you worked real hard and Council worked real hard to get us under budget. And I think it was close to a million bucks, somewhere in that range.

And I really want to thank Dr. P and Andy and your staff and the school, too, for, you know, being transparent, coming in here and talking through it. You know, we got a tough job to balance things.

And Andy, I really appreciate you not going crazy with the signs. You know what I mean? I love that, you know. And you were

1 good. You were respectful. And we were 2 kidding around, but that does mean a lot to us, 3 it really does, you know. Because we are all partners. You know what I mean? And you guys 4 5 are passionate about what you do. And you know, me and Keasha, we went to 6 7 Easton High. We went to public school here. So it means a lot to us, too. 8 9 So you guys keep up the good work. We're 10 here for you. So you need to know that. 11 But Mr. Stepp, do you want to say a few 12 words? 13 MR. STAMP: Mr. Stepp? 14 MR. CALLAHAN: I said it again; didn't I? 15 I've done that twice now. 16 Sorry, Dave. I didn't want to do that to 17 you, you know.

Mr. Stamp. God.

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MR. STAMP: Council, I'd just like to say a couple of things real quick.

The department heads, they were highly

supportive of the process that we had this year.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah.

MR. STAMP: They respected it. They felt good about it. So we did check in with them on that.

Again, kudos to you, Council, for the time that you put in. I think that Talbot County, with your efforts and the efforts of our staff, I agree, Kaitlin, Martha, Jessica, the team came together and worked really hard this year.

And you know, we recognized -- we built on a foundation of conservative budgeting that we inherited from previous Councils. And it's served this county well over the years.

And we are in a bit of unchartered waters right now. You know, the fiscal or the economic landscape out there is a bumpy ride right now. When Thomas Barkin was here from the Fed, he used the analogy of driving a car in the fog. You slow down, you put your

flashers on, you may even have to pull over.

So this year, we knew that we needed to flatten the budget out, we needed to live within our means. This on the back side of investing largely in education and public safety. And we're at a place right now where we can level off.

This Council has seen that we've built a good rainy day fund and set a reserve policy, which is fiscally prudent. And this was all confirmed by our recent rating by both Moody's and Fitch.

Fitch reaffirmed our AAA rating, and Moody's reaffirmed our AA1 rating as well. And that's something that you all can be very proud of and the people of Talbot County.

So thank you for your leadership. Thank you, staff, for everything that we're doing.

I think we're in the right place at the right time, and we're doing the job for the people. So thank you.

And we're here to talk about the FY24 homestretch difficult to serve properties grant that we received.

So we're going to turn the narrative on its head a little bit, in that instead of asking for money, we're asking for permission to turn back some money to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development.

So we received a \$1.1 million grant. And we applied in late 2023 and were awarded the grant in February of 2024. And this is for properties that are difficult to serve with

broadband. And as you know, we have a ongoing project that is going to set us up for the future and deliver broadband access to every citizen in Talbot County.

And the difficult to serve properties were those that were a little bit more difficult to fund. And the State of Maryland had a pot of money. They decided to divide it equally and to make it available to jurisdictions.

So the reason we're here talking about this is because we're the grant holder and not our partner, Easton Utilities.

So in the recent visit with Jake Day, the secretary of Department of Housing and Community Development, their deputy director for the Office of Statewide Broadband was there. And they mentioned to us that they would like for us to consider, if we were going to have any unused funds by the end of the project, and if we might be able to share with other counties.

And so I'm going to turn it to John here to describe to you what the thinking was, the logic, and what the recommendation is.

So John.

MR. HORNER: Sure. Good evening, Council.

When we were first asked about this by the Department of Housing and Community

Development, we sharpened our pencils, took a look at all of the grant funding we still have available. And this source of grant funding, frankly, is the one source that is the least cost effective to those that would benefit from it.

In other words, there's more strings attached to this particular type of grant funding than there are to some of the other ones that remain out there.

As an example, the USDA reconnect program offered to us an additional \$1.5 million in basically grant funding that we could use for all purposes associated with broadband,

including the drops for customers in the grant-funded area.

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This particular type of grant funding we're limited in the amount of funding we can use per property. And there is a large match associated with using this limited amount of grant funding for each property.

So we took a look at all the funding we have left, and there was an opportunity for us to return \$400,000 of the 1.1 million.

This does not change the fact that we are the first county to be fully funded to provide broadband to all of those who are unserved.

And we still intend to complete the project by or before the end of next calendar year.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. All right.

MR. HORNER: One more thing, if you don't mind.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yes.

MR. HORNER: Mr. Callahan.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yes.

MR. HORNER: We also did not want to get to the end of this project and have not sharpened our pencils and have \$400,000 in funding left and be asked the question when we asked you earlier why didn't you consider returning the funds then.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah.

MR. HORNER: So I'm just putting that out there as well.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay.

MS. VANHOOSER: So it won't affect the project at all. And you have a letter before you to consider our recommendation, which is to return \$400,000 of a \$1.1 million grant.

MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Mr. Lesher.

MR. LESHER: Well, congratulations I guess. Thank you.

The good news here, of course, is that the project is moving ahead with, with -- in fully funded fashion and on schedule. And for that, you have a lot of happy new customers, and

those same people are happy constituents to me.

And for that, I owe you a lot of thanks, you

and your team and your contractors who are

making this happen out there all across the

county.

Thank you for doing this.

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MR. CALLAHAN: Okay. Yup.

MS. MIELKE: And in this day and age, to have a basis for some conservative use of funds is very impressive.

So appreciate your gesture and what you're doing. Thank you.

MS. HAYTHE: Yeah. I echo what my colleagues said. To return money is probably a first.

But certainly agree with your recommendation. So thank you for bringing this to our attention.

Marilyn Neal is here, the executive director of the Neighborhood Service Center, as well.

In 1964, the Economic Opportunity Act was launched known as the war on poverty and created community action agencies across the country to address poverty through community driven solutions funded directly from the federal government.

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And then in 1981, the Community Services
Block Grant Act replaced the direct federal
funding with block grants to States,
consolidating various programs, while
maintaining the core mission of the community
action agencies, reducing poverty and promoting
self sufficiency.

State of Maryland, under the Housing and Community Development Article 8-104 of the Maryland law, counties may designate a community action agency. However, such designation does not obligate the county to provide funding.

Designated community action agencies must meet State oversight requirements, including annual reporting to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development, to ensure fiscal and programmatic compliance.

Talbot County. In January of 1985, the
Talbot County Council designated the
Neighborhood Service Center as the official

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community action agency. Although not legally required, the county has provided funding support, which averaged \$83,000 annually between 2008 and 2020, then increased each year to about \$374,473 in FY2025. This is both for operating and capital funding.

Most of the Neighborhood Service Center's funding is derived from federal, State, and private sources. County involvement is limited to its authority to designate a community action agency and have representation on the Neighborhood Service Center Board, as outlined in its bylaws.

And the Neighborhood Service Center is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization governed by bylaws with representation from local government, community organizations, and individuals who support its mission. It operates independently of the Talbot County government.

As a designated community action agency,

the Neighborhood Service Center reports to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development and the US Department of Health and Human Services.

So hopefully that sheds some light on the relationship between Talbot County government and the Neighborhood Service Center as our community action agency.

So I just wanted to let y'all know, too, that we'll be coordinating with David A. Bramble associated with the closure of the road, as well as the Glebe Road roadwork as well.

So we're going to do as much as we can to minimize any impacts as the road is closed and they're doing any resurfacing.

Again, we were trying to do this between June 15th, when the permit allows us to start work, up to Labor Day at this point in time.

What I will be honest with you is that we just met with Easton Utilities and Verizon to try and wrap up our utility relocations this morning. And we're hoping at this point in time that we can still proceed with the June 15th.

But if we are not able to do that and we have to slide it out further, let's say

June 21st or 22nd, we'll do that.

We're not going to close the road just to close the road. So it will be closed when we're ready to do the work.

But we're coming before you all to begin the process of providing notices to the various agencies and departments as well as providing public notice as well.

MR. STAMP: And Council, this is -- Ray, I mean you can speak to this. This is part of a larger project.

MR. CLARKE: It is.

MR. STAMP: That started sometime ago,

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which includes the overlay on Airport Road and Goldsborough Neck, the widening of Goldsborough Neck Road that occurred some years ago.

And of course, you know, it narrowed back down at Villa up to Glebe Road because of that culvert area. And this would complete this project.

It will be an inconvenience clearly to a lot of folks because that's a well-used piece of roadway.

But as you see on the map up there, the detour would be through Mistletoe Drive back out to Goldsborough Neck beyond the construction site.

Ray, the question is is this -- once you start the project, will the closure be permanent or will there be days it might be open or not?

MR. CLARKE: Unfortunately, it's going to be best for us to close the road completely so we can stage out there. So the key would be

for us to stage.

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One of the things we are going to be doing on the upstream side of the culvert just southwest of Villa, we're going to actually have to pour the wing walls. So we're going to have to have forms set up and concrete delivered and whatnot.

So we will have to close that section of roadway. We're hoping for as minimal time as possible.

So if we can get that road reopened and go to a single lane closure, we'll do that.

So I would anticipate right now, probably on looking at about a six-week time frame for full closure. But if we can keep it less than that, we will do so.

MR. CALLAHAN: That's great.

MR. CLARKE: And I guess real guick.

MR. CALLAHAN: Yeah.

MR. CLARKE: This is also part of that rural economic investment fund that we're

receiving \$750,000 towards that project. So we have to get this done before December. So that's the other reason we're pushing.
