Madam Secretary, would you please read the title, please.

SECRETARY: A bill to amend chapter 121 of 17 the Talbot County Code, public landings, to temporarily grandfather for a period of one year certain slip holders who currently hold more than one county slip, thereby delaying the
effect of the prohibition on renting more than one boat slip established by Talbot County Bill 1407 and giving such qualifying slip holders additional time to find alternative affordable slip accommodations.

MR. PACK: Thank you, Madam Secretary.
I believe this was introduced by -- by introduced, we're going to do that this evening. This was drafted by Mr. Divilio and Mr. Callahan. Do either one of you have anything to say on this matter? If not.

MR. DIVILIO: I think it's pretty self-explanatory. I'll speak for a second, if you like.

So what we're doing is last year the previous Council adopted the legislation of everybody who had two slips had to give up one. What we're asking for here is basically a stay for one more year to help two people who were not able to identify affordable slips within their areas.

What this is is watermen who work two different rivers at different times of the year and needing to be able to keep their boat at those different locations, with the goal of us getting back together with the Parks and Rec Board to try to see if we can find some more slips, some more space, better usage of the marinas that we have currently or see if we can find some other land to purchase. Trying to figure out the best way for the county to help the watermen by just approving what we're got currently.

MR. PACK: Okay. This is introduction. So I will save any comments.

I have read the draft of the bill. I do have some concerns, but I'll save those for another time. One that jumps out at me is that you already have persons who have already given up their slips and how will they be compensated for their efforts. So we'll wait and address that at another time.

The snack bar will be open. It will just kind of be an event to bring everybody
together. They're actually having an artist come and make some mosaic thing that we can hang in our building after the event. So that's pretty cool.

And then also this summer we started Let's Roll Summer Skate Nights with roller skating. We actually haven't done public roller skating in a few years just because of the decline in attendance.

MR. PACK: Lack of demand.
MS. GILMER: And so we decided to start up skate nights. We did two a month in June, July, and August. And so that was pretty decent turnout for the different dates of that.

MR. PEPER: I know the first roller skating we did, we actually had them lined up out the door. There were over 300 people that showed up for the first night of skating.

The thought is making it two nights a week instead of three -- two times a month rather than three times a week. It made it more
focused so people actually had more interest in showing up on those nights. We had a DJ with those kind of things.

So again, like our Daddy Daughter Skate is very popular. We get over 80 dads that sign up every time. We have two sessions. The problem that we run into is we might have to expand it to a third night because the problem is is that because there's skating involved it in and every dad seems to all fit, I mean most of the dads only wear about five different size skates. And we run out so fast. So you actually can't skate because you run out of the skates. So we might have to actually make a third night for that.

But then just coupling on that, new facilities, new field rentals. These are things that haven't been done in the past. So we tried to branch out with bring in more revenue, bring in more people to the Community Center.
